Thirty-six Years and Counting

Interview with Allen Mills of Lost and Found Bluegrass Band

Thirty-six and a half years show a special commitment to a single undertaking, but this is how long Allen Mills has been making bluegrass music. In Virginia, in 1973, four musicians joined together and the bluegrass band we now know as Lost and Found had its beginning. Allen Mills, Dempsey Young, Gene Parker and Roger Handy combined their talents and abilities to create a signature sound within the bluegrass genre. Allen and I visited about the sound that is Lost and Found and he said, "early on we set the tone for this band and as people (musicians) come into the band they have molded into what has already been set. It's like the house was built, you just moved in and accepted it like it was." I guess if you've been successfully doing it for over 30 years, don't try to fix what ain't broke. Allen and the band have tried to follow the advice he'd heard Sonny Osborne once give, "play your strengths and stay away from your weaknesses." Allen elaborated on how this applied to the way Lost and Found works and chooses their material to be successful.

"What we done is found song, or wrote the songs, found songs and did the arrangements on that would fit what we could do. Don't try to do what you can't. If you can't do it well, don't do it." As you listen to their dozen or so cultivated what they do well.

The longevity of Lost and Found is a direct result of the commitment of Allen Mills and Dempsey Young. For thirty three years the two of the face of Mills and Young were a constant. In December of 2006, this changed with the unexpected passing of mandolinist, Dempsey Young. The current Lost and Found lineup is Allen Mills on the bass, Scottie Sparks on guitar, Ronald Smith on banjo, and Scott Napier on mandolin. Alan was very complimentary of his band members, both individually and as a whole. Alan said, "All these guys travel good" which is a very important attribute, since at the time of my interview, they had been traveling full-time,

together, across the country in a bus for six weeks.


Beyond being good travelers, Allen said of the band, "All three of these guys have a passion." This point is evident as you listen to them play. Elaborating a little about each member, of Ronald Smith he said, "This boy here, loves Scruggs music, can executes it well and can play what the other banjo players have played... and is a fine, outstanding banjo player." Smith has played with Lost and Found for the past nine years, but completed his first recording with a band on the mandolin, at age 12. Scottie Sparks, guitarist, for the band has been playing professionally since he was 15 years old. He joined Lost and Found in 2001 and sings lead and tenor. Of Sparks Allen said, "Scottie is a great guitar player and a good singer; I love to sing with him."

Mandolinist, Scot Napier, is the newest member to the Lost and Found line-up. He's had big shoes to fill after the passing of Dempsey Young. But Dempsey had been a mentor to Scott throughout the years and Scott acknowledges Dempsey as a major influence in his own development. Scott was invited to play the first couple of shows after Young's passing and later was both honored and humbled as the call came from Mills, to join Lost and Found, saying, "If you want a job, you've got one here." Valley Bluegrass Stage:

4 Bluegrass Bands in Lewiston

Sometimes bluegrassers north of the Boise valley might feel like they don't get their fair share of bluegrass concerts, but that will change this month. On SAT, April 17th, four bluegrass bands will take the stage at 7 pm at Clarkston HS at an event called the Valley Bluegrass Stage. Patterned after the Saturday Night Music Showcase hosted by our sister association, Inland Northwest Bluegrass Association, organizer Scott Lombard decided to see if this kind of event would draw support in the Lewiston and surrounding areas. This first show is just to test the waters and see if there is an audience base to support a monthly evening of bluegrass. Each band will play a 30 minute set, so listeners will get a full 2 hours of bluegrass. This kind of event is a benefit to both bluegrass listeners and bands, as it provides a venue for bluegrass music beyond the summer festival season. Based on the evening's success, organizers plan to start in the fall with a monthly offering of bluegrass throughout the school year. Higher Ground, Clearwater, Yankee Blue and Wanigan are the bands featured in April. There is a \$5.00 admission charge which will be used to cover the cost of the facility. Lost and Found Bluegrass Band appear at Bob's Bluegrass Barn

Tuesday night, March 9th, I got a phone call from Helen Smith inviting me to hitch a ride with her over to Nampa to go to the Lost and Found Bluegrass Band's concert at Bob and June Greer's Bluegrass Barn. I was thrilled beyond anything and immediately began packing because we were headed out the following morning.

Wednesday, Helen picked me up at the bottom of our mountain and we were off; bluegrass on the Sirius Radio and two ladies singing along between all the yakking, as down the road we headed. A quick stop in Council to pick up some good popcorn and then we were back on the road.

Finally we arrived in Nampa and took our exit off the interstate. We came to the first light and of course it was red. As we pulled up to stop, there out my window in the lane next to us was the Lost and Found bus. Helen spotted it first, as I was still yakking. The license plate said LANDF and we knew it was them. Wow, the excitement was mounting as we headed towards the barn. Once there Helen and I watched as Bob guided them in to park, then we were greeted by a lot of our friends already there to help Bob set up. Wow what a fun night this was going to be!

Soon the band was setting up and doing their sound check. ISBA member Rudy Corbett was running their sound and had recently bought some new equipment so was very excited to get to try it out. Helen and I got a delicious meal of ham with all the trimmings cooked up by June and then we had fun listening to them warming up and getting everything just right for the show. Shortly after 6 people started coming in for the show and it was filling up fast. They knew that in order to get a good seat an early arrival was necessary. Soon more and more people were arriving and the barn was filled to capacity.

The concert began to a sold out crowd, and oh what a band. They put on a great show and the crowd went wild cheering them on as they played one tune after another.

Half way thru the show they took a break and sold CD's and a very fun cookbook that Helen and this writer just had to buy. Have you heard of the **Lost and Found Interview Continued...**

Crooked Road in Virginia? Well, this cookbook is filled with historical interviews and stories from the people who live along the Crooked Road along with their recipes. I love bluegrass history and stories so I knew that this was the book for me.

One song after another until finally the night had to end. I was so wound up after such a wonderful show that I had to lie in bed reading my new cook/history book. Finally, at midnight lights went out as I kept the memory in my dreams. Ah, another great bluegrass night.

was in the middle of recording an album at that time. Scott helped the band finish the project. Explaining the consistency and help Scott gave to the completion of that album, Allen said, "Dempsey played on half album, Scott on the other tunes. A lot of people say they have a hard time tellin' who's doing what, so that's a great compliment on his part.

Allen and I also visited about the change he has seen in the music and recording business in the past 50 years, about the changes in the way a listener has access to music; 78s, to 45s, to albums, the changes in radio and now the Internet. He said, "I think the way you (a musician) present the music never changes – it stays the same. The way you hear the music and the way you get it has changed drastically."

I had read that Allen does all the booking for the band and all the mechanic work on the bus. I teased him a little. Our conversation went as follows:

"You do all the booking, and have for 36½ years; you are also the bus mechanic, I understand."

"You want to know why?"

"Yes, why is that?"

"It's about \$75 an hour, every time you workin' out there, you makin' \$75 an hour."

"Yeah, but does it show up in your pay check?"

He grinned and said, "If you don't do it, it will show up in your paycheck. All that is part of Application for Membership

what you gotta do to make it work. It's like preparing a meal... if you don't have a stove, how you gonna cook biscuits? It's that relative, it's the whole ingredient to what you gotta do – if you don't, you get eat up by it, or you only play in this little circle, you don't ever get out of it. You either learn to do it, or you pay someone and it will put you in the poorhouse immediately."

In the tradition of those early bluegrass musicians who piled into a car and drove from town to town, Allen Mills, in company with the other Lost and Found band members, have been traveling across the country for going on forty years. As their bluegrass fathers before, they work hard at booking their own shows, drivin' and fixin' the bus and pickin' some pretty fine bluegrass in a distinctive style that is all their own.

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
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
